



## Sen. Wiley Victorious; Lee Defeated In Utah

### Primaries Held In 8 States

Voters in the Republican primary of Wisconsin won the nomination for the U. S. Senate in one of eight primary contests in which U. S. voters balloted yesterday.

The political hopes of some nationally known figures were dampened in some of the other seven contests. Republican Gov. J. Bracken Lee of Utah conceded defeat in a bid for an unprecedented fourth Senate term. Brannen, author of the controversial farm plan bearing his name and secretary of agriculture under President Truman, was defeated by a political newcomer, George D. Clyde, who said he is "100 per cent behind" the incumbent.

Georgia holds a Democratic primary tomorrow, leaving only Rhode Island and Massachusetts in which state contests still to be decided.

Other results yesterday:

The outcome of the Democratic senatorial primary battle in Wisconsin was settled earlier, when Elliott Walstead conceded victory to Sen. Henry Maier. Walstead is a former state party chairman.

**NO POSITION**

None of the nine incumbent Wisconsin representatives had primary opposition.

Gov. Gen. Vernon Thompson was unopposed in the Republican nomination for governor. William Proxmire had no opposition for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination. Republican Gov. Walter J. Kohler is not seeking reelection.

In Utah, Gov. Lee conceded defeat after returns showed him trailing by 5,000 votes at the three-quarter mark. It was generally expected that he would be defeated.

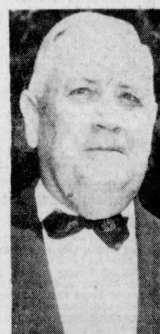
**FREQUENT CRASHES**

## Guard 'Outfoxes' Segregationists

National Guardsmen "outfoxed" anti-integrationists at Clay, Ky., today as two Negro children were escorted to the previously all-white school.

State Adj. Gen. J. B. Williams, commander of the Kentucky National Guard, personally escorted Mrs. James Gordon and her two children, James, 10, and Teresa, 8, to the school.

"We outfoxed them again," Williams said. "It was part of my strategy to have the children go to school at Providence yesterday to throw the people off the score."

Mrs. Gordon enrolled her two youngsters at the all-Negro Providence school yesterday and it was thought racial troubles in Clay were over. Twice mobs formed to turn away the Gordon children when they attempted to enter the Clay school.

**QUIET IN TEXAS**

The situation was quiet at Texarkana, Tex., where two Negro youths had attempted to enter the Texarkana Junior College on Monday. A crowd of several hundred white persons gathered the college entrance Monday and Tuesday to prevent the Negroes from going inside. Yesterday, the youths did not show up.

National Guardsmen held demonstrations today from Clinton, Tenn., and Sturgis, Ky., after weekend demonstrations against school integration ran out of steam.

The last contingent of 50 Tennessee guardsmen slipped quiet out of Clinton last night after 500 white pupils and 11 Negroes at the school were escorted peacefully, but several hundred Kentucky troops remained at hand in the Chicago area.

The only indication of further resistance at Clinton was a petition filed by the Tennessee Federation for Constitutional Government asking the State Supreme Court to order the school closed.

**19 DIE IN ATTACK**

JERUSALEM, Jordan Sector (AP)—A Jordan military source said 19 Jordan policemen and National guard officers were killed today in an attack on a police post in Jordan's Hebron area.

**Teacher Poisons Self  
As Lover Takes A Walk**

NEW YORK (AP)—A suicide pact led today to the death of an attractive 25-year-old teacher who drank wine poisoned with cyanide, police reported. A man friend from Turkey lost his nerve and lived.

The teacher, Avis Gray, died in a Riverside Drive hotel room which was engaged yesterday by Hugo Stiefel. He had registered as "Hugo and Avis Stiefel, Istanbul, Turkey."

Stiefel is an exchange student from Turkey and apparently had met Miss Gray while she was there as a student at the American College in Istanbul.

Police quoted him as saying he and Miss Gray had agreed upon a plan to take their lives together. "But he said he 'lost his nerve and went for a walk,'" according to investigators. He had been quoted earlier as saying Miss Gray talked him out of drinking the poison and advised him to "take a walk."

He was later quoted as saying he left the hotel and when he returned at 3:30 a.m. he found Miss Gray sprawled on the bed.

The death came to police attention when Stiefel went to police station after finding Miss Gray's body at the hotel, the Park Crescent, 150 Riverside Dr.

Miss Gray was the daughter of Dr. Herman A. Gray, a Fifth Avenue attorney and professor of law at New York University. Her mother, Sarah, is supervisor of a city health department dental clinic in Brooklyn.

LONDON (AP)—Britain and France announced today the United States is joining them in setting up an international association which will undertake to carry traffic through the Suez Canal.

## Egypt Says Suez Pilots Free To Quit

CAIRO (AP)—A spokesman for the Egyptian Suez Canal Authority said today "foreign pilots and employees who wish to quit their jobs are free to do so."

The statement followed an earlier declaration by a spokesman for foreign pilots and employees of the old Suez Canal Co. that they intended to quit their jobs on Friday night.

**INTERNATIONAL ANARCHY**

"In ignoring the charter of the United Nations and taking the law into our own hands we are reverting to international anarchy," Gaitkell said.

However, Britain and France already had taken a first step toward putting the Suez control before the U. N. They delivered a letter today to the president of the U. N. Security Council, advising him that Egypt has created a situation which might endanger free use of the canal. Any formal motion against Egypt in the security council would run the risk of a Soviet veto.

Another development was the imminent walkout of many of the non-Egyptian pilots who take ships through the canal's tricky waters. Egypt is speeding up her plans to replace these pilots as necessary.

Eden said all the canal's main users will be invited to join the new protective association.

## Pay Up, Old Boy; \$1 Per Month Is Out

CLEVELAND (AP)—The Alexander family has been paying the government \$1-a-year rent for a 17-room mansion for seven years, but a federal judge says no more.

Judge Paul Jones ordered Brady to move out and pay the government \$1,800 back rent — \$10 a month for the last 18 months.

How did Brady ever get a deal like that?

He sold the house to the government for \$1,250 in 1938. The government planned to build a veteran's hospital on Brady's property and 43 adjacent lots.

The people who lived in the 13 other houses also sold to the government and moved out.

But Brady wanted to stay on. So he got a government man to sign an agreement, renting him the house at \$1 a year "until such time as the premises are actually needed for the purpose for which purchased."

That day never came. Immediate plans for the hospital were canceled.

Eighteen months ago, the government ordered Brady to move. He refused and displayed his agreement.

Asst. U. S. Atty. Russell Aked argued in court that the agreement was invalid because the government officer who signed it had no such authority.

Judge Jones agreed. "I don't think there is any rhyme or reason to his position," he said. "What if the hospital were never built?"

## Winnie The Imperturbable Really Ill-Tempered Winnie

LONDON (AP)—One of Sir Winston Churchill's oldest friends has debunked the legend of Churchill's imperturbable World War II.

Lord Brabazon of Tara says Churchill was vile-tempered, heaping abuse on those who worked with him. He tells the story in a new autobiography, "The Brabazon Story."

Brabazon, aviation pioneer and sportswoman, was Minister of Aircraft Production for a time in one of Churchill's wartime cabinets.

## 3 Boys Kill Sleeping Father To Have Free Run Of House

NORWALK, Calif. (AP)—Three brothers — 10, 9 and 7 — showed no remorse today after admitting, police said that they carried out a plot to kill their sleeping father.

And, homicide Lt. Al Etzel said, the boys told of planning to shoot their mother, too, "so they could run the house the way they wanted." But no attempt was made on her life.

Thomas William Parker, 31, a steelworker, died last night of a bullet wound in the head.

Etzel said he was told by Tommy, 10, Bobby, 9, and Richard, 7.

The boys decided to shoot their father after he reprimanded them for breaking into a neighbor's garage and taking 22-caliber ammunition.

When they were sure he was asleep, Richard fired the shot.

"Go on in and shoot Daddy," Etzel said.

A fourth brother, Harry, 4, and a 2-year-old sister were not in on the plot.

Their mother, Mrs. Betty Parker, 28, who is expecting another child, discovered the shooting when she returned home.

Etzel said the boys had an unusual knowledge of guns, imparted by their father. They could take a gun apart and reassemble it like veterans, he said.

The boys were turned over to juvenile authorities.

## Junaluska Opposed Methodists Argue Over Meeting Site

LAKE JUNALUSKA—Questions raised by a New York attorney opposing the Lake Junaluska site as headquarters for the World Methodist Council have been called "immaterial and slanted" by Edwin L. Jones of Charlotte.

Today Mr. Jones, head of the board of trustees at this Methodist assembly ground where the World Methodist Conference ended its 12-day meeting, made a rebuttal to the argument raised by Charles Parlin of New York.

Mr. Parlin stirred last week's meeting with questions concerning the suitability of this site for conference headquarters.

On his motion the council agreed to accept a new \$10,000 World Methodist building here only in so far as historical matter and research material are concerned.

The decision on whether to use or some other location shall be headquarters has been referred to an executive committee for later action.

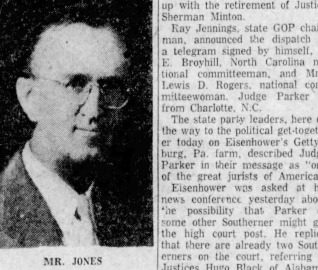
**NEW YORKER'S DOUBTS**

In answer to Mr. Parlin's doubts that Negro Methodists would have full use of headquarters on these grounds owned by the Southern Christian Jurisdiction, Mr. Jones said:

"Our Negro brethren, when on the business of the World Methodist Council, are as welcome as any students from among them would find no hindrance to their studies."

"There are some things about the laws of North Carolina that may not suit some persons; we do not deny," Mr. Jones said.
