

#### The Indictment Broadens

Chief Littlejohn, Judge Redd of the juvenile cour and Judges Whiting and Bobbins of police court added their testimony yesterday to the broadening indictment of Chrioties siums. They all aspeed emphatically that the conditions under which people in the slums lived was a first cause of delinquency and crime. Indeed, Judge Redd went so far as to say that it was futile to expect re-habilitation of juvenile delinquents if they had to be returned to the bilghted areas in which most of his coses originated.

But it isn't only delinquency that breeds in these places unfit for human habitation. Perhaps the graves of all crimes is murder, and the murder rate of this city compares unfavorably with the worst. In 1835, for example, the last year, for which comparative statistics are available, murders the country over were about eight per 100,000 persons.
