

"A Learning Situation"

The eagerness with which educa-tors themselves have made pilgrim-ages to see Richard F. Lille's new method of school operation in El-ierbe, as described in this paper yes-terday, indicates the originality of what the man is doing. Schools, he thinks, are made for pupils rather than for teachers, and as such are institutions to develop each child ac-cording to his capacity for learning those things he can learn best. He says:

says:

"The school curriculum should be built around the needs of the greatest number of the children. If a genius falls into our laps here at Ellerbe, we will take care of him, but most of our children are only average; so our curriculum is planned for them... You must set up a learning situation. You can't forcibly cram a teatbook into the brains of a child."
