The Government Reckons With Strikes Its Policy Incited

Was the Government's lawful selzure of the Air Associates plant at Bendix, N. J., necessary and advisable? A sensible answer requires a review of the facts in the case and a fair interpretation of

It seems clear that the company was finally at fault because of its failure to

comply with the re-comply with the re-comply with the re-mmendation of the Mediation Board by reinstating the strik-ers. Furthermore, the company abought to go through the mo-tions of carrying out

company aought to company aought to company aought to go through the motions of carrying out the board's recommendation while actually flouting it. Strikers were discriminated against by auch unworthy means as putting machinists to scrubbing floors.

80 far as Defense work was concerned, however, it could have gone on at this plant uninterrupted had public order been maintained. Fewer than half of this 700 employees were participating in the CIO's strike. Mass picketing was made possible only by volunteers from other unions. To the company's call for workers to take the places of the strikers, 2,300 men responded. But the plant slayed siruck.

It was an ugly situation and the Mediakon Board's difermma was whether to break the strike in favor of the company or to restore the status quo. It decided, perhaps wisely, upon the latter course, only to have the company of the course, only to have the company balk. Thus blame for the stoppage of work distributes itself in two ways. Industrial relations in this country never should have been allowed, much less encouraged, to have reached a stage wherein he more trutulent employees of a plant may with impunity assert the authority, backed up by force, to say whether or not it shall run and on what ferma. We are more self-ansataining than any other nation perhaps. We nave all of the tron ore we need. But steel-making requires manganere. We must import about 1,100,000 tons a year, according to Dr. William Y. Elliett. OPM expert handling import alockpiles. We haven't been able to find that much as yet. An expanded defense program may require even more manganese. We must bring in more than 1,000,000 tons a year from such far-away places as indis. Africa, and the Phillippinas, to supplement domestic production and sources being developed in Cuba. There is a constant necessity to get ships out across the Pacific or over to Airica to pick up car-cere of these obstances the second transgoes of these indispensible raw materials for the defense program.

If we were 160 per cent isolation-let we would still have to go and get this essential material - for I don't hear any of the isolationists saying they would exps defense. De they expect that even with isolation, they could get strong defense with-out management, for instance, for instance,

I am isolating one or two examples here to suggest the difficulty more clear-ly. Actually the whole business is a wast complex of materials.

WE COULD BUILD A SECOND-RATE INDUSTRY

You can make artificial rubber. We could perhaps, if we could sparse the machinery, erect enough artificial rubber plants to replace our consumption of rubber. That would mean building enough artificial rubber plants to produce the equivalent of half of the worlds total production of rubber. Also world's total production of rubber. Also we have a lot of allers and we could substitute that for copper in some electrical work. We could substitute silver in solder. We could use solver steel and go all around into a second-rate sind of industry and perhaps continue to liveable for the second with the second conditions.
