Enemy Planes Lashing At Our Air Bases

planes, but a communiqué said that although reports on the enemy's progress in the Philippines were meagre, it is believed our losses were slight.

Some Japanese planes—those number underlined—were reported shot down. A number of anti-aircraft batteries were credited with bringing down one of the attacking planes.

KLASH AT AIR BASE

In possibly the heaviest attack of the day the Japanese bombed military objectives in the Manila area—particularly Nichols Field.

(Bert Stern, N.Y. correspondent, said in a broadcast from the Philippines that the Japanese were in the field apparently were slight but that for almost a mile civilian homes were set alight.)

The raiders met strong resistance from fighter planes and anti-aircraft batteries.

HEAVY SWASH BY AIR

The enemy planes first appeared just after noon and the attack developed into apparently the heaviest of the day at Nichols Field.

Bomb attacks on other points in the Philippines earlier had been reported.

An Associated Press staff member, Clark Lee, watched the raid from the Manila radio station and saw American of Philippine fighters blast into the formation of Japanese bombers.

The fighter craft attacked from above the planes and then flew up from below to get a second crack at the formation.

ONE AFTER TWO

Ground watchers saw one spectacular dog-fight when a lone American plane closed in and engaged two Japanese planes. The two Japanese appeared in the clouds to the west with the battle still raging.

The spurt of raiding followed a night of shooting in Manila where civilians and soldiers, ordered to "shoot to kill," were engaged in a battle of attrition.

The fighters shot into several houses and killed several civilians. Pedestrians and motorists who failed to respond to challenge after curfew also drew the fire of the guards.

In one district, a large clock shop a sign flashed on and was immediately shut out.

The authorities have arrested more than 500 Europeans in a roundup of Italians and Germans.

The Axis nations have been given trucks packed with containers of food at hand.

The plan for a swift help from the United States was voiced by U. S. High Commissioner Francis B. Sayre in a broadcast to the United States.

"We know you back home want to help and you don't need any kind of excuse, or capital and labor disputes or any other effective help in order to get it," he said.

from Manila that "we are in the fight to stay."

OUTPOSTS STAND

The two tiny outposts of Wake and Midway likewise were staying in the fight and thrilling the American people by their resistance.

Official reports said that the hard-bitten Marine garrisons were standing firm despite the Japanese air and sea attacks which had been expected to overwhelm the island bases soon after the Pearl Harbor assault.

(Imperial Tokyo headquarters obliquely conceded that American forces were still holding out on Wake Island when they said that military headquarters there had been severely damaged in an attack by Japanese naval units.

The nation's hope for an on-the-spot report from Hawaii was dashed when, when atmospheric conditions prevented a broadcast, a long early morning broadcast by Honolulu, which had been interrupted after the Pearl Harbor surprise of last Sunday.

NO ARIZONA COMMENT

The Navy Department here had no comment on a Japanese report that the 22,000-ton U. S. battleship Arizona had been sunk in a surprise blow at Pearl Harbor.

Reuter, British news agency, translated a communiqué to that effect which the agency said had been broadcast from Tokyo. Previously, the Japanese had claimed to have sunk the Arizona and the USS Oklahoma at the Pearl Harbor raid.
