Now that the United States has en-Now that the Unified States has en-tered the war, the two Overments are in a position to transform that charter, or statement of principles, into a com-pact with which others like Russis, Chins, the Latin American nations and the Governments in easile could affuliate. Thus would be set up the core of a new free world, bound together not only for victory but to win the peace afterward.

Such a program requires, first, Joint conduct of the war. This would operate through an Interallied War Council on the military side. With it would go joint econômic measures, and pooling of shipping, plus fiuld financial and material assistance already operating through the lend-lease policy.
