Richmond--The following official dispatch has been received:
Murfreesboro, Dec. 8--An expedition sent under acting Brigadier-General John R. Morgan attacked an outpost of the enemy at Hartsville on the Cumberland yesterday morning, killing and wounding 300, captured 1800 prisoners, two pieces of artillery, and 2000 small arms and other stores at the position.
