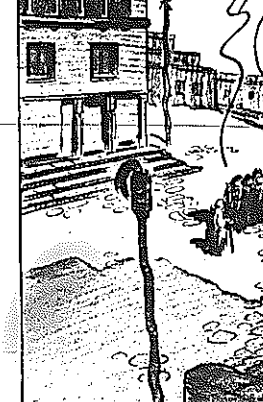
NOT NEW, BUT OLD

We had a relief crisis and it was necessary that the Government help the people. But this crisis came that he has used that situation as a means of indulging in mass vote buying.

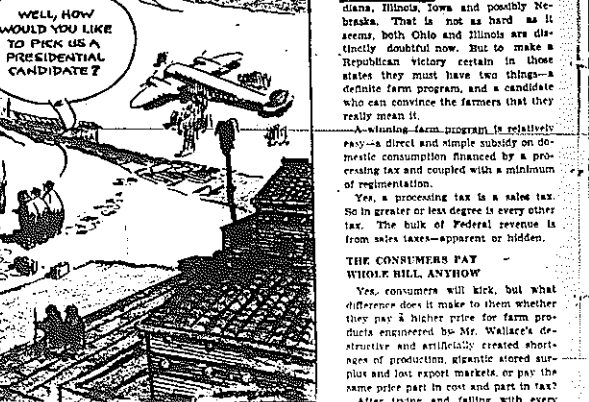
HE EMBARRASSES HIS FOLKSWISERS BY THIS
