Negro Police Experiment Needs Help, Not Animus

One reason the previous City Administration declined to use Negro officers in police work was its conviction that the agitation for such a new de-partment sprang parity from social and eronomic mulives. a large delegation is as ill-advised as anybling could be — and there is nothing
to show that such a delegation would
represent the stituted or leading Charlotte Negroes, or would be representative of them. of them.

Use of them.

A far more sensible procedure would be for all of us, Council and clittens of both races, to give the experiment a chance, not to conderm it because it conferred authority upon Negro officers and not to conderm it because it conferred limited authority upon Negro officers. To do otherwise would be only to exacerbate racial relations that fare best under low pressure.
