Formal War The Case For and Against

An Open Declaration

The United States is at war. No matter how vigorously the Wheeler-Lindbergh crowd denies it, we have been at war for many months now. It is possible to say exactly when we got in. At the moment. Hitler became Chancellor of the Betch he, by the nature of his presumounced program, declared war upon all of the democracies. All that has happened between that, moment and his has been an intensification of the struggle.

As American resistance to Hitler has

As American resistance to Hitter has become more resolute with each passing week, there has been an increasing demand for an open and official declaration of war.

At first glance, it might appear that a declaration of war against Germany is the honest, straight-forward thing to do. There are certain other undeniable advantages of such action:

deantages of such action:

1. British morale would be greatly stimulated by a formal declaration: The shole Empire would get at least a Temporary shot in the arm."

2. The morale of the German Phophe would be folied, particularly among that part of the population who has not forgotten how America's entry heralded the turning of the lide last time.

On the other hand there are several excellent reasons why the undeclared war policy may be best for the imme-diate present:

1. There is the matter of timing. We can declare ware but once in this fight. A declaration is our ace in the hole and we must not allow our-

the hole and we must not attow our-scloes to throw it away; we must use it when it will take the biggest pot. English morale has been helped by the Nazi-Russian war and seems to be in no immediate danger of cracking.

2. As long as we refrain from an open declaration, we, with England, can say how the war will be run; a good many people ucho remember the last war recall that after we

the last war recall that after we gat in, it was England's show from then on. We were largely a slient partner.

3. A declaration of war would mean that all the bars against German submarine attacks on our stapping (if there are day restrictions remaining) would be down. Our ships touch be attacked wherever U-beats sighted them—and we need those ships.

those ships.

4. Although public sentiment is fast crystallicing for a forthright stand against Germany, it is doubtful that the entire nation is ready for a var declaration yet. A premature declaration might set off an unfavorable reaction.

5. All available information indi-cates that we are not yet prepared to send an expeditionary lorse to an overseas battlefeld and such a battlefeld would be difficult to find. A declaration of war, to be most ef-fective, should be accompanied by immediate and forceful military

Apparently President Roosevelt has considered all of these factors and more. It appears that he is not yet ready for

the final break.

We Americans like to announce our intentions openly and honestly. We prefer to observe the usages of formal diplomacy. But we have learned through painful experience that when we deal with a gang of international raiseals, anything goes.




