The People Want To Pay War Costs As They Go

H the survey of American laz sentiment recently completed by Colliers Magnaine is accurate—and there is every reason to beliere that it is—the people of the United States may well take this occasion. to kick a few well take this

of the United Blatze may went take this occasion to kiek a few accusations in the panta. The charges against the people had been pilling up thick and fast. Members of Congress, college professors, economists, and the inevitable "experts" no coused the nation of being unwilling to pay the expenses of defense out of current tax revenues. Administration leaders judging the temper of Congression of the people—are planning to borrow just as much as they tax, thus heaping up a super national debt. But the Collier's survey, during which 10,000 American families were interviewed by 450 investigators, shows that so per cent of the people not only are willing to pay—thry want to pay the entire cost of national defense as they 50.

What kind of taxes do the people prefer? Well, the experts and the economists, and even a few politicians have been cussin out the sales tax. They call it a "poor man's tax" and declare that the people are against it.

Yet the Collier's survey reveals that 50 per cent of the people—considerably more than President Roosevelt's popular majority in the last election—prefer that sales tax to raise revenue for national defense purposes. Twenty-two per cent perfer deutions from wages—another tax the "experts" dared only to whisper. Only thirteen per cent of the people prefer that fair-haired boy of the "experts" the mome tax.

Two conclusions, then: (1) The people want to pay as they go and it is up to Congress to see that they do: (2) The people had rather make a lot of little payments than a few big ones and this, we submit, is evidence that the "easy payment plan" is now woven into our national fiber.
