First is the economic reason. We are in the first stages of price-fining. Price administrator Leon Henderson is mortiseathly and pertitionally. Price ceilings out to stock and prices mother lines have been bidd by neconicition. Around the conner is spectral price-neutral legislation. We now have reneral supporties regulated and ner emiscials are being placed under rationing control daily. The policy has been laid down that wage raises will not be accepted as justification for price raises. We are not going into a policy of permitting unlimited wage increases by the casy route of thowing up increas to conmitting unlimited wast increases of the easy route of shoring up prices to cover the advance. Thus there is coming into existence a literal limit to the amount that wages can be increased. This sit-nation still has considerable flexibility but it is bound to tighten gradually.
