Japanese Cabinet Loses Last Remnant of Cautious Men

Prince Konoye of Japan has announced the names of his new cabinet ministers. While it is rash to attempt to plumb the Prince's oriental and therefore inscrut-able mind, several conclusions are now rather obvious. Yosuke Matsuoka and four other cab-

inst members have been squeezed out.
With them goes the last trace of political party, constitutional government into Japanese regime. They have been replaced by men like Tanabe and Bakonji. replaced by men like Tanabe and Bakonji -ardent militariat, men who have turned their back on the West. The new regime is completely totalitarian. It is a concentration of power, dedicated to military conquest at any cost. Matsuoka, the clever attaceman who

Matsuoka, the claver stateman who engineered the Axis pact and on top of that the non-aggression treaty with Russia, understands at least something of America's determination not to be cut off from the East Indies. His successor Admiral Toyoda, is one of the men who has consistently threatened the United Blates and our Navy. He is a source of blood-and-thunder newspaper stories about how war between Japan and the United States is inevitable. Admiral Toyoda is a danger spot in the new cabinet.

Another ominous sign is the promotion of Baron Hirsnuma from minister-without-portfolio in the old cabinet to Vice-Premier of the new one. The Baron is perhaps the most powerful and ruth-

without-portfolio in the old cabinet to Vice-Prenier of the new one. The Baron is perhaps the most powerful and ruthless man in Japan. He hates Hritain and the United States. He is one of the founders of the present militarist clique that has Japan by the throat. All of this means that the last feeble brakes that attempted to slow down the Nipponese cabinet in its rush toward war with the democracies have been removed. It means that the last chance for a peaceful understanding between Japan and the United States has vanished. No matter what the United States proposed, there is no one in the Japanese cabinet who would listen. The break is as absolute as if suddenly there were no more Japanese who understood English.
