Yesterday a nationally syndicated column-not the Washington Merry-Go-Round-victously attacked what it alleged was "coddling and pampering" of the new United States Army.

Specifically, Mr. Ray Tucker, author of the piece to which we refer, declared:

"The Army, incidentally, is cool toward Thomas E. Dewey's USO drive which is designed to erect social centers in towns and cities outside army cantonments, GHQ believes that it can provide within the camps all the entertainment the need. The generals are afraid that Mr. Dewey's program will sissify the boys in khaki."

As for "OHQ" believing "that It can provide within the camps all the entertainment the soldiers need," well, we'd like to take Mr. Tucker down to Fort Parage of a Sunday and let him see how much entertainment it is possible to rovide on the recervation for more than 50,000 zoldiers. The commanders of military camps have been the first to condemn the mushrooming of questionable "joints" around their areas and to plead for the substitution of wholesome recreation facilities.
