150 Students To Get Honor At Ceremony

At the annual Honors Convocation this Saturday, at Arizona State College, more than 150 students from 48 Arizona Communities will be honored for their scholastic achievement during the past year.

The convocation, held in conjunction with Morn and Dad's Day, will be held at 10:30 a.m. in the College Union Auditorium. Chairman of the convocation is Dr. Charles W. Meister, dean of instruction at ASC.

Giving the convocation address will be Dr. Margaret Carrigan, ASC professor of English. Her address, using the formula "A/X equals AA", urges students to cultivate their inner space, and that as they do, the bar "X" between present achievement and future potentiality will disappear. The "X" of their as yet unexpanded potentialities will become the "A" of their future accomplishment, the mature twin of the "A" of their present excellence.

Honored at the convocation will be the highest ranking scholars of the sophomore, junior, and senior classes. Also recognized during the 1961-62 academic year will be those ranking in the top 10 percent of the freshman class, last year's sophomores with a grade average of 1.6 or better, and junior scholars with a grade average of 1.6 or better.

Coconino County's top 4-H members stood up and were recognized last night for a year's hard work and achievement.

The awards to a total of 24 county youngsters were presented at the annual 4-H Recognition Banquet, sponsored by the Flagstaff Branch of Valley National Bank, and held at the Elks Lodge 489.

And the champion of all the champions at last night's dinner was Flagstaff's Kelly Keithly, son of Dr. and Mrs. A. G. Keithly, who walked away with a total of four awards.

In addition to being awarded a trip to Chicago to attend the National 4-H Congress in November, young Kelly won the Arizona Public Service Award for an outstanding electrical project, and National County Medal Awards in beef, leadership, and electricity.

For young Kelly, this year's electrical awards marked the fourth consecutive time he has won both the Public Service and medal awards in this field.

But there were other champions too.

Carol Brechan, was awarded her trip to Chicago, and received Medal Awards in the fields of home economics and dress review.

In Off-Duty Time

State Patrolman Captures Trio on Charges of Robbery

CAMERON (Special) — An off-duty Highway Patrolman used his spare time yesterday to capture a trio of youthful would-be hold-up artists headed by a 20-year-old girl from New York City.

Held in the Coconino County jail on charges of attempted robbery, in connection with a try at holding up a service station near Belmont on Monday evening, are Vickie Raye Booth, 20, New York City; and her two 19-year-old companions James Paul Hendershot and Walter Gene Harclerode, both of Las Vegas, Nev.

The trio was arrested here yesterday afternoon by Arizona Highway Patrolman Lynn Taylor after a two-day search of the entire Northland for them.

At the time he made the arrest, Taylor was in an off-duty status. The trio is accused of having attempted to hold up the Whiting Bros. service station at Belmont, operated by Clyde Leachman, on Monday evening.

Leachman told County Sheriff's Deputies that the girl had come to the door of his residence around 7:15 p.m. Monday wearing a sweatshirt with a hood over her head and carrying a gun.

He slammed the door in her face and then ordered his wife and three children to stretch prone on the floor.

As he did this, a second member of the party broke a window in the house—located directly behind the service station—and stuck a gun through the break.

However, he could not locate anyone in the house and the trio then left the station.

Telephone wires at the station had been cut, Leachman reported, and his wife went to a neighborhood store to call deputies.

Bulletins

OXFORD, Miss. (AP) — A shouting crowd of students at the University of Mississippi blocked Negro James H. Meredith's path from the student Union building briefly Wednesday.

A team of federal marshals moved in quickly and cleared a path allowing the 29-year-old Negro to leave.

Sixty-nine truckloads of U.S. Army soldiers of the 5th mechanized infantry division began moving through Flagstaff at noon today on their way to Ft. Carson, Colo.

Last week end the troops moved through Flagstaff to Ft. Irwin, Calif., and most of them had reached their destination when they were ordered by the Defense Department back to Ft. Carson.

A spokesman for the division said today he did not know whether the shift in troops was due to the Cuban crisis.

Approximately 3,000 troops of the division were turned back before they reached Flagstaff.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Britain and Venezuela today threw their support behind the U.S. military quarantine of Cuba as Acting U.N. Secretary-General U Thant weighed a small national appeal that he intervene in an attempt to head off a U.S.-Soviet showdown.

Soviet Leader Assures Russell Of Peace Intent

MOSCOW (AP)—Premier Khrushchev tonight said a "meeting at the highest level would be useful to discuss all questions that have arisen and to eliminate the threat of nuclear war."

Khrushchev made the statement in a message to the British philosopher, Bertrand Russell. The text of the message was broadcast by Moscow Radio.

The Khrushchev message, in reply to a plea from Russell for Soviet efforts to avoid a nuclear war, said: "We would consider a meeting at the highest level would be useful to discuss all questions that have arisen to eliminate the threat of nuclear war."

Khrushchev, referring to the American blockade of arms shipments to Cuba, told Russell:

"The Soviet government will not take any decisions which would be reckless, will not allow itself to be provoked by unwarranted actions of the United States of America."

"We will do everything in our power to prevent war from breaking out."

"The United States government must display reserve and stay the realization of its piratical threats which are fraught with the most serious consequences."

U.S., Reds Near Armed Showdown

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States and the Soviet Communists approached an armed showdown on the high seas at mid-morning today, as Soviet cargo ships plowed toward Cuba and American naval power converged on them.

At 10:30 a.m., with the quarantine officially in effect for 3½ hours, the Defense Department said it had no reports of interception of any ships.

The department also said it had no report that any of the Cuba-bound Russian ships had changed their course.

Strung out along the approaches to Cuba were an estimated 25 Soviet ships. Some of them quite possibly were carrying offensive weapons to the Cuban Communist ally—a movement which President Kennedy says must be stopped.

At 7 a.m., Kennedy's quarantine went into effect and the historic moment was at hand. The first war-ships headed in toward the first Soviet cargo ships.

A few hours before, the Navy had broadcast radio warnings to all shipping to stand clear of the area, that it could become dangerous.

There was a report that Soviet Embassy officials here were claiming that no Soviet ship would heed the stop signal of any U.S. warship.

Cuba's Fidel Castro saw the quarantine as an act of war and Moscow took a grave and angry view.

For more than a year the tension between the United States and Cuba had mounted. Then on Monday night, Kennedy made his move, announcing a quarantine with the clamp on offensive arms shipments into Cuba. He was accepting the fact that anything might happen as a result.

Heber Teacher Not Guilty

HOLBROOK (Special) — A Navajo County jury yesterday found a former Heber school teacher innocent on charges of having committed unnatural sex acts and lewd and lascivious acts with members of a grammar school verdict.

The jury retired from the courtroom at 4 p.m. yesterday and returned at 6 p.m. with a verdict of not guilty in favor of Ernest C. Bowler, 38, charged with having committed the alleged acts last December, January, and February with members of the Heber school basketball team.

The trial — which lasted eight days — saw Navajo County Attorney Fred O. Wilson, prosecuting the case for the state, call to the stand members of the team who were involved in the alleged acts.

Defense attorneys Richard R. Zielenksie and Joseph H. Morgan, Phoenix, called both Bowler and his wife to the stand to speak in his behalf.

The trial was presided over by Coconino County Judge Laurence T. Wren, who took the place of Navajo County Judge Don Udall.
