

U.S. FIRES PROBE AT RADIATION BELT

CAPE CANAVERAL — The Explorer 15 satellite roared into orbit Saturday night to study an artificial radiation belt formed by a U.S. high-altitude nuclear explosion last summer.

A Thor-Delta rocket propelled the payload into space at 6:15 p.m. and seven hours later the National Aeronautics and Space Administration reported a successful orbit was achieved.

The 98-pound package settled into a wide-looping course ranging from 190 to 10,950 miles above the earth. The path, only slightly higher than intended, will permit complete survey of the man-made radiation.

There was no immediate word on quality of data being received.

Earlier, a project official had reported apparent success of the launching.

Blockade Pro, Con Rallies in S.F. Park

More than 2,000 demonstrators praised and denounced President Kennedy's Cuban crisis policy in two separate and colorful rallies held side-by-side in San Francisco Saturday.

Significantly, it marked the first time in the memory of veteran policemen that a University of California fraternity — Phi Delta Theta — had been the nucleus in organization of a political rally.

The Phi Deltas, led by engineering graduate student Tom Coakley, 29, of Piedmont, son of Alameda County District Attorney J. Frank Coakley, drew 500 vocal young people to a demonstration "in support of American Cuban Policy."

But young Coakley's group was outnumbered by 1,500 persons at the adjacent rally who heard a variety of speakers denounce Kennedy as "a mad man" and demand withdrawal of the Cuba blockade and removal of U.S. bases in Turkey in exchange for Russian withdrawal from Cuba.

Actor Stirling Hayden called for massive protests of the blockade action, denounced the "ruthlessness of our leadership" and said: "President Kennedy is determined to liquidate the social revolution in this hemisphere."

San Francisco Police Chief Tom Cahill, fearing a clash between the two groups, brought 200 policemen to the area of the Civic Center Plaza in what he called, "The biggest crowd control plan I've ever organized."

Mounted policemen patrolled in front of city hall. Police dogs, platoons of motorcycle officers and a group of police women were posted out of sight. Beatnik dressed officers roamed the crowd, but only one uniformed officer actually stood between the two groups holding demonstrations 100 yards apart.

A band of 125 Cuban refugees, led by Cuban attorney William Murrero, drew cheers from the crowd when they arrived at the pro-Kennedy rally. Speaker after speaker supporting the Cuba blockade drew loud cheers and "Amen" shouts from the Pro-Kennedy group.

'MAN FROM MARS'

Young Coakley, who said he feared a clash if the refugees mixed with the other group, climaxed his demonstration by sending Cubans and fraternity men marching to another demonstration in front of Communist Party headquarters half a mile away.

There was a minor scuffle at the Pro-Kennedy rally and a speaker claiming to support the other group's right to free speech was jeered down. The Anti-Kennedy policy group also silenced a green-painted, space-uniformed "Man from Mars" who demanded he be allowed to speak to save humanity.

Attendance at the Anti-Kennedy rally fell far below police estimates. "This was because not a single legitimate 'peace movement' group would have anything to do with this thing," said Carl

Two Sides Picket U.N., White House

NEW YORK — A half-dozen eggs from a swank apartment building splattered among 2,000 persons demonstrating outside the United Nations Saturday against the U.S. blockade of Cuba.

Most of the pickets represented the "Fair Play for Cuba Committee." The rest came from the Student Peace Union. Police divided them into two groups. Pickets carried pro-Cuban placards and chanted such slogans as "We Want Fidel—Kennedy to Hell!" and "No Blockade—Don't Invade."

About five blocks away at United Nations Plaza, a group of 100 anti-Castro pickets marched in support of President Kennedy's action.

At Washington, an estimated 500 marched in front of the White House, waving banners for and against the blockade.

Police responsible for keeping the diverse groups separated arrested three for disorderly conduct. A man carrying a sign saying "President Kennedy is a Traitor" was hauled off for a while.

First on the scene were representatives of the Student Peace Union from Eastern and Midwest colleges and universities.

Next were anti-Castro Cubans.

Then college boys, mostly from Georgetown University, appeared with signs saying "Better Dead than Red" and "Invade Cuba, Attack the Reds."

Alongside watched demonstrators for the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy and the Women's Strike for Peace.

In the Chicago Loop, Women for Peace and the Student Peace Union staged a protest of President Kennedy's actions. Thirty college

students countered their demonstration. In Moscow a well-organized but mostly casual crowd marched to the U.S. Embassy in the biggest anti-American demonstration in Moscow since the start of the crisis. It had a raucous start but a mild end when police ordered the crowd to go home. Bottles of ink were thrown and several windows were smashed. The demonstrators carried signs saying "Shame on Kennedy" and "Cuba Da, Yankee Nyet."

In London, constabulary waded into a crowd of hands-off-Cuba demonstrators in downtown London and arrested 147. Forty others were arrested in Manchester. Scuffles started when members of Lord Bertrand Russell's Committee of 100 — off-Cuba demonstrators in tried to force their way into Trafalgar Square after a request for a demonstration there had been denied. At Milan, Italy, police clashed with leftists in a pro-Castro riot.
